Run Report

Lytle Creek Run leader: Oscar Lizarraga

Anderson Dry Lake Trail Recon Run Leader: Pete Johnson





Nine vehicles carrying fourteen trailbreakers showed up at Anderson Dry Lake March 10th for the third attempt to break a "moderate" trail in the Fry Mountains for use during Hi Desert Roundup. Present were Pete Johnson, Ray and Karen Kleinhuizen, Don Young, Terry Puckett and associates, Rick Walter and Rhonda Graves, Randy and Donna Huddleston, Paul Coursey, Cort Phelps, and Trail Hook Danny Ward. Weather was warm and sunny with little wind.

Plan for the day was to find a new canyon route to the west side of the Fry Mountains to bypass some of the power line road, recon the north loop of the trail opened by Jeff Jernigan in January of last year, and try to link up with the Fry Mountain part of Jesse May's Blue Moon run for passage back to the dry lake.



A new canyon route (not the one intended, but unused except for ATV's) was found to the west side of the Fry's that intersects the powerline road near the summit. At this point Don found he had only 2WHi available, so he headed home down the powerline road. The rest of the gang boogied up the powerline road to the north loop of Jeff's trail. After successfully negotiating the squeeze in the Poison Canyon cutoff that Dan, Don and Pete opened this January, we more or less followed it (with one 0.6 mile U-turn and backtrack up Wrong Turn Canyon) to the 4' dry waterfall on the north end of the loop. Terry earned a cow bell in the rock garden leading up to the drop off and took the by pass rather than going down the drop off. The dropoff was successfully negotiated by most of the rig's but Randy Huddleston earned a cow bell when he got high centered half way down and was strapped back to the top. Randy took a different line and made it down on the second try. We proceeded to the squeeze that we massaged with rock bars and sledgehammers in January 2011. This needed further massaging (seems like the rocks grew back together since last year) for the Cherokee. Shortly after the squeeze, Rick had some difficulty negotiating the dry waterfall climb after the sharp left, so we skipped this obstacle and rambled down the wash to the valley, where we headed south to the west front of the Fry's to link up with the Bluemoon Trail. (Note: At some point Terry questioned the Club's definition of "moderate".) We were not able to backtrack Jesse's trail, however, due to a steep uphill section that exceeds the "moderate" rating (See, Terry, we do know when to quit.) We took ATV trails west through a low pass back to the dry Lake, arriving at about 4 PM.

Thanks to some good luck in finding our way, the participation of a lot of guys who know how to handle a sledge hammer and rock bar, and the presence of good looking women to brighten up the scenery, it looks like we just might be able to put together something for HDR. With a little refinement, it should make a decent trail. Anybody got a funky name for it?

Regular Adopt A Trail meeting place

April

13-15 Steele Pass (Death Valley) Trail Leader: Ray Kleinhuizen

Meeting Location: Pilot travel center / Outpost cafe located at the intersection of the 15 Fwy and Hwy 395. Take the 15 Fwy toward Barstow and exit at the Hwy 395 junction. Pilot travel center is on the right at the first traffic light.

Meeting Time : 8:30 am on Friday April 13, plan is to leave for the trail at 9:00 am. Come early for breakfast at the Outpost cafe or Wendy's.

Trail Description: The Steele Pass trail is considered one of the more difficult back country trails in Death Valley. The trail starts in the northwest part of Death Valley and heads south to Saline Valley Rd. The plan is to leave the meet location and travel north on Hwy 395 to Big Pine. We will stop for lunch before reaching Big Pine. Big Pine is the last chance for gas and supplies before heading into Death Valley. From Big Pine we'll head east on Hwy 168 and turn right on Death Valley Rd. After traveling about 40 miles we will turn right on South Eueka Vallev Rd and travel about 9.5 miles to the Eueka Dunes dry camp where we will camp on Friday night. Saturday morning we'll leave camp at 9:00 am for the Steele Pass trail. The rough and narrow trail runs 29 miles to Warm Springs. The most difficult part is Dedeckera Canyon where the trail climbs several dry bedrock falls. 6.8 Miles past the Warm Springs we will intersect Saline Valley Rd.

At this point we'll make a decision to either camp for the night or head southeast to the Lippincott rd. 4x4 trail. This is a steep narrow winding trail that goes into the Racetrack Valley area of Death Valley park. Racetrack Valley is where the mysterious moving rocks are located we'll spend some time exploring this area on Sunday.

Difficulty: 2.0 on a scale of 1-5 (1=Easy, 5=Most Difficult) Dedeckera Canyon could be a 2.5.

Run Type: This run is expedition 4-wheeling (similar to the Mohave trail) in Death Valley. This means we're going to be exploring the backcountry trails during the day and dry camping at night.

Special Equipment Required: Stock 4WD with high ground clearance and low range gears. There are several narrow sections that could be difficult for wider vehicles. Tire damage is possible a good condition spare is required. No water or gas will be available after we leave Big Pine until we reach paved roads in Death Valley Sunday so bring extra gas and water.

Reminder to Bring: This is a backcountry trail in a remote area. Bring food and water for at least three days. Camping gear: tent, sleeping bag, chairs, firewood, basic tools, shovel, Camera, extra clothing, etc. (a more detailed list will be available to those who plan to attend)

Permits Required: We'll pick up any required permits at the Lone Pine rangers station on Hwy 395.

Expected Weather: This area has a wide range of possible weather conditions from very hot to very cold. Trail leader will monitor the weather forecast for Steel Pass and distribute conditions leading up to the day of departure.

Meeting Location: TNT Cafe, 14767 Bear Valley Rd, Hesperia. From the OC, take the 15 Fwy east toward Barstow/Las Vegas. Exit at Bear Valley Rd. and turn right. The TNT Cafe is about 100 Yards from the 15 Fwy on the right.

Meeting Time: 8:00 am on Saturday May 5. leave the trail head at 8:15 am. Come early for breakfast at TNT Cafe.

Trail Description: Rattlesnake is more a scenic trail than hard core 4x4 trail. It is a moderate trail that passes through a narrow canyon with soft sandy soil. At the end of Rattlesnake canyon we will be on Burns Canyon Rd and head over to the Heartbreak Ridge trail, a black diamond trail. It is considered difficult but not super difficult. The trail includes narrow canyons, steep shelf roads, large boulders and sharp rocks with the possibility of body damage. A detour is available if you want to skip Heartbreak Ridge.

Difficulty: 3 to 3.85 (1=Easy, 5=Most Difficult)

Special Equipment Required: High ground clearance with limited slip or lockers, 31 inch tires minimum. Possibility of tire damage is high. A good condition spare is required.

Reminder to Bring: Bring lunch and extra water, chairs, basic tools, shovel, camera, extra clothing, etc

Weather: If its raining the trip is canceled due to possible flash flooding.

Trail Head Coordinates: On Hwy 247, GPS 34 22 12.2 N, 116 38 59.6 W

Message with the following information: Please use the words "Run Announcement" in the Subject line of the message, forward to the webmaster and newsletter editor to be copied and pasted.

- Date/Time and Place for the Run
- Description of Run
- Difficulty Rating on a scale of 1 to 5
- Run Type: Base Camp, Day Run
- Detailed Directions to Meeting Place.
- EXACT Departure Time from Meeting Place
- Required Equipment. Open dif? Lockers?
- Is Special Equipment Required?
- Is RSVP Required?
- Are Permits Required? (Forest Adventure Pass etc.)
- CB Channel start with channel 4, if to much traffic on channel 4 then switch to 5 and so on.
- Camping Location/ Directions/ Details/ Facilities/ Fees. Access for motor homes? Very little ground clearance? Deep soft sand?
- Expected Weather Conditions.
- Contact Information (Leader Phone Number & email address)
- Please cover all the needed information in the Run Announcement rather than say "contact me for details".

Start of the Run

- Hold brief driver's gathering before start of run. Include special instructions.
- Assign vehicle order if there are vehicles with open diffs. Have vehicle with locked diff in front & behind. (If possible disperse vehicles with HAM radios near the front, middle and rear of the line.
- Encourage drivers to learn the name of the person in front and behind his/her vehicle.
- Assign "Sweep Vehicle" (Tail Gunner Vehicle)
- Give 5 Minute Warning before start
- Begin Run ON TIME or notify everyone of new time.
- Announce Departure over CB channel 4
- Start moving slowly
- Stop at all turns to confirm vehicle behind sees turn
- Stop occasionally to close up ranks
- Announce comfort stops

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• Announce Lunch Stop and Length of Stop <u>After returning home</u> forward to *the webmaster and newsletter editor to be copied and pasted* a Run Report and a few photos. In the subject line write "Run Report"

The cow bell rules are: If you get stuck and are unable to move under your own power and need the help of a winch or you get strapped from one of your fellow jeepers then you have earned the privilege of hanging a cow bell from your front bumper. You must leave the cow bell on the front of your rig until another Dirt Devil gets stuck then, you can proudly hand it over.

Safety Report

Safety administrator Danny Ward

When on the trail keep an eye out for the rig behind you. For groups larger than 10 there needs to be a 1) leader, 2) tail gunner and a 3) mid rig.

Basic safety equipment should include: first aid kit, fire extinguisher, CB radio, tow strap, extra food and water, basic tool kit, some spare parts, safety glasses, gloves, full size spare, working emergency brake.

Large Velcro straps are handy for keeping your straps together.

When you believe there is a chance of rolling over grab your seat belt and hold on. Do not grab the roll bar or reach out to stop your rig from rolling over.

If your gear is not tied down well then it will get thrown around.

Dishpan Springs Trail can be found in the San Bernardino National Forest near Lake Arrowhead. The Dishpan Springs Trail is one of the toughest and most popular trails in the SBNF.
